







- Three out of four seniors suffer from multimorbidity
- Over 50 million Europeans are multimorbid


The Challenge



Healthcare systems are organised by individual diseases or body parts

Multimorbid patients and their informal carers need to:

- Navigate through fragmented 'healthcare silos'
- Manage numerous treatments, medications, and appointments
- Communicate with various
 physicians about their multimorbidity




The Challenge



Healthcare silos & complex care pathways result in:

- Reduced quality of life
- Ineffective or delayed treatments
- Negative drug-drug interactions
- Financial and logistical burden on healthcare systems



Objectives



The consortium will:

- Create a holistic, integrated and patient-centred approach for treating multimorbid elderly patients.
- Utilise **eHealth technologies** and multimorbidity data to create integrated treatment plans across six European countries and languages.
- Employ Care Managers to liaise between the patient and their specialist team, reducing the care burden faced by informal carers (i.e., spouses and children).
- Outline that the implementation of ESCAPE's blended-collaborative care model is more cost-effective for healthcare systems.
- Evaluate the practicality and acceptance of ESCAPE's blended-collaborative care model by patients and their carers.

Impacts



The consortium will:

- Promote the integration of ESCAPE's blended-collaborative care model into healthcare systems across Europe
- Improve the physical and mental health of elderly patients by:
 - better coordinating GP appointments
 - reducing negative drug-drug interactions and hospitalisations.
- **Update outdated Clinical Guidelines and Best Practices** for the management of elderly multimorbid patients.
- Increase the innovation capacity of the European health and social care industry.
- Address the inequality faced by multimorbid patients based on gender, geography, and socioeconomic status.

Impacts on informal carers

NEXUS Overview

Nexus: connecting research, policy and practices to support young carers project seeks to develop, test and disseminate a training programme to provide youth workers with the skills required to engage young persons they work with in research to make it more participatory, action-focused, participant-led, and ultimately more suitable to support evidence-based policy-making at all levels of governance.

The project will contribute to reinforcing links between policy, research and practice in the youth and welfare sector by raising awareness on the importance of young carers' involvement in research and policy development among support workers and by upskilling them.



NEXUS Objectives

- Give participants the opportunity to work through example sessions that could be run with young carers in their national contexts through a self-paced MOOC.
- Develop policy recommendation reports supporting the mainstreaming of project results into the practice, research and policy levels through a series of creative-methods based workshops.
- Help the European society evolve through the intergenerational learning and cooperation between young, adult and older people in the research and policy trainings.
- Create stronger links among research, policy and practice in youth work through supporting the capacity and skills of youth workers to inform evidence-based policies at European level.
- Promote active-citizenship and participation of young persons that youth workers work with.



TARGET GROUPS

- Youth workers, who work with youth with caring responsibilities to facilitate their personal, social, and educational development. They have different academic backgrounds and work either as employees or volunteers.
- **Researchers, and professionals** working in advocacy and policy development and decision-makers at local, national and EU level.
- Young people with caring responsibilities: they will be involved in the pilot phase of the project and they will benefit of the upskilling of youth workers.




FINAL DELIVERABLES

- A developed and tested training programme covering the basics of participatory research and European policy mechanisms: by the end of the programme, participants will have acquired knowledge, skills, tools, motivation in engaging with academia and advocacy organizations to work together to provide evidence-based policy proposals taking into account the needs of young carers. In parallel, evidence-based research will also help them to reflect and improve their practice with young people with caring responsibilities.
- A MOOC supplemented by a recommendation report to ensure that results can be re-used beyond the conclusion of the European funding and accessed by the wider community of professionals and stakeholders across Europe.
