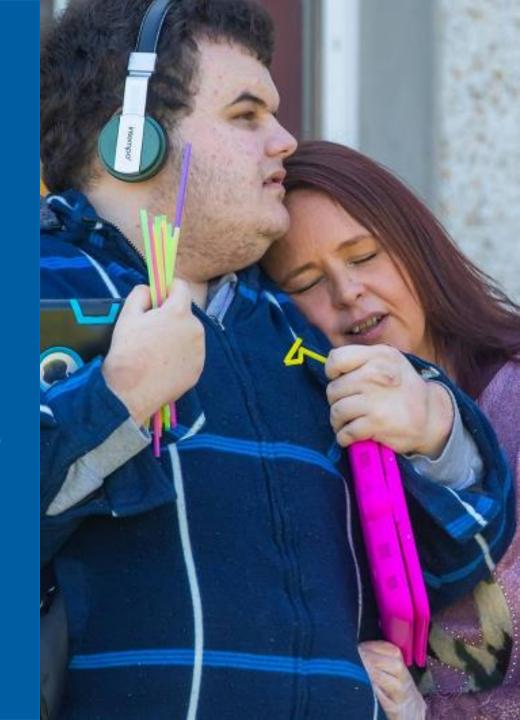

Carers Views

"Fighting, fighting for everything, for speech and language, for occupational therapy, for physiotherapy, for school places. You're fighting for everything all the time. That's the most challenging."

"It is very invasive."

"It's [dealing with services/DSP over the phone] horrible. It's degrading."

"There is a really long soul destroying form [for Carer's Allowance]."

"You feel like you're begging for something you're entitled to. I worked all my life and paid tax all my life."

"You're living in fear of reassessments because the reassessments are made so difficult."









Summary of Recommendations



Introduce a Participation Income (PI) based non-means tested Family Carer's **Income Support (FCIS)**



Establish a PI FCIS Implementation Group



Ensure adequacy of PI FCIS by benchmarking and indexing



Establish a Navigational Operations Group to improve navigational processes

Understanding Carer Harm

'When carers experience violence or become subject to controlling or coercive behaviour resulting in physical, psychological and/or sexual harm' (Isham et al., 2020)

Carers and professionals struggled to define and understand 'Carer Harm' as a term.

It is not common nor recognisable

Experiences of harm ranged from screaming, destruction of possessions, significant physical violence and resulting emotional distress



"She would beat down the door, she has broken the door about three or four times. And when she can't get at me she will break every, and has done it, break everything that you can see"—Autism Carer

"Verbally abusive, hitting out that kind of things...most of it was due to frustration"- Dementia Carer

I was home on my own, my husband was in work and D came back from school and D had a tremendous meltdown and he pulled my hair even though he doesn't usually do that, but that day he did. He was only eight or nine and he pulled me with such force that he pulled me on the ground and I hit my head on the ground and I was there for a few seconds. And then my eldest child came from school, so imagine D was nine so my eldest was eleven, can you imagine what it's like for an eleven year old child to restrain his brother on the sofa to give me the chance to get up. I'll remember this day to the day I die. Like my eldest was crying, he was saying 'Mammy I don't know for how long more I can restrain him'"

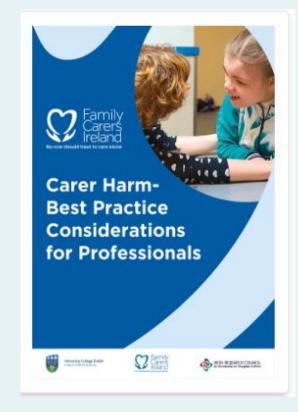

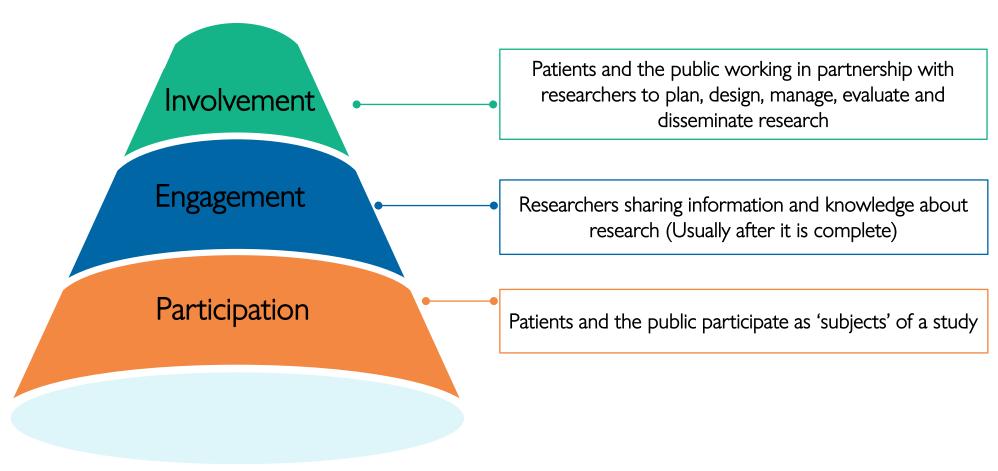
Family Carers Ireland and PPI
