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

Our priorities in 2015

- Legislative and policy aspects of carers' situation
- The value and costs of caring
- Health and well-being
- Coordination of care systems (at all levels)
- New technologies
- The role of friends, neighbours and volunteers
- What's worked well and why? Documenting and exchanging national experiences

Our thinking (GL & HN)

- Conditions for care provision of IC (after Covid)
- Long term effects of Covid among ICs and care situations
- Implicit costs of IC (under 'costs')
- Impact on socio economic conditions
- Impact of increased mobility and urbanisation
- Labour market participation (incl. gender differences); balancing care and work
- Skills and competencies of informal carers
- Professional carers who are IC as well
- Deployment of (non-)paid laymen, citizens, volunteers, migrant workers; integrating ICs in formal care systems; caring neighbourhoods
- Administrative burden on ICs
- Tailoring policy and practice to diversity of needs of ICs
- Ethics of informal care irt formal care
- Scaling up implementation

Methodologies

- Aims of research: to contribute to learning, improvement and implementation of appropriate care and support
- Effectiveness of interventions and measures
- Research based on Theories of Change/Logic Models
- To contextualise research
- Involvement of and co-design with ICs in (participative) action research endeavours and policy development
- RCT's are not the 'gold standard' for research into LTC
- Include: participatory action research, responsive evaluations, appreciative inquiry, qualitative and multiple method designs approaches, narrative and ethnographic research, realist evaluation
- Critical on large scale data collection: validity, reliabilty, generalisation, expenses, explanatory value, administrative burden

- Which themes are most relevant for the near future (your 'top three')?

- Which themes or additions to the current should be added?

How to ensure an effective translation and implementation of research outcomes?

Just some initial reflections... (1/2)

- 1. An effective implementation/traslation of scientific findings into advocacy and policy action is desireable and possible, at all levels
- 2. Ingredients (= success factors): availability of:
 - a.expertise able to translate (international / scientific) recommendations into practical/policy action (top-down?)
 - b.pragmatic ability to involve civil society organisations in a participatory approach (bottom-up?)
 - c. political will & humbleness to learn from others, and to collaborate betw. different actors and levels;
 - d.an adequate amount of funding.

Just some initial reflections.. (2/2)

- 3. Major risks & key steps to tackle them:
 - **a. lack of visibility:** need to count on sufficient and efficient resources for an ongoing communication campaign to raise awareness in society & policy-makers;
 - **b. lack of support / "envy" by key partners**: need to be inclusive and involve them, thus making clear that success can only be achieved as the result of a joint, common effort;
 - c. resignation or insufficient trust: need to be clear about urgency of taking action to fight for the rights of informal carers, via adequate initiatives and... be persistent and patient!

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
